There's also a couple of packers up in Montana who offer tips on how to prep for a safe and unforgettable backcountry adventure...thought I'd share them here (*courtesy Western Horseman*):

3. Hold your horses (all about free-rangin')
4. Get local knowledge (always fun)
5. Make an itinerary (oh man...)

8. Go with the right gear

This is also a real good time to check out all your tack and safety equipment. Make sure all your clips and snaps and screws and straps are in good shape. Don't forget your trailer...or your buddy's trailer...got to make sure all those lights work, that the hitch and safety chain are easy enough to use, and that the trailer has all those things that come in handy. And now with Daylight Savings Time there's even time in the evening for a short ride to the park. As always, here's to workin' together and ridin' together...see you on the trail...

MAU REPORT

Lets have a heart-to-heart talk.....

Meet Michael Wade, CPR and Wilderness First Aid extraordinaire! The former EMT, Forensics Technician, American Heart Association instructor, and backcountry enthusiast, gave an eye opening training session to our Mounted Assistance Unit members and a few ETI members. Stressing real life First Aid and CPR scenarios, Mike's methods captivated the audience.

Did you know.....mouth to mouth is no longer part of the CPR method. CPR is now chest compression only! Remember the head needs to be tilted back to clear the air passage way. Turns out a shoe between the shoulder blades will do the trick – who knew? Bottom line, medical studies showed that the time spent doing mouth to mouth was found to be ineffective and more detrimental than compression only CPR. And the potential oral transmission of disease gave cause to this further change in approach.

Who needs band aids....super glue is a recommended method in closing wounds both on people and animals. Yes, you can use super glue to close a minor cut on your horse (after the wound has been flushed clean). Consensus among all attendees that it was the unique and fascinating First Aid "class" they had ever taken. Personally, I could have listened to him for another 4 hours!

Upcoming MAU Events Mark your calendar now:

Saturday, April 12th - Sensory Clinic at the O'Neill Regional Park Public Arena. This fun event is a great opportunity to bond with your horse while desensitizing him/her to the crazy world around us.

Follow it up with a Sensory Trail Trial on Sunday, April 13th. Test your knowledge and skill and that of your horses through a challenging course of equine obstacles.

HORSE TALES

Are They All That Warm and Fuzzy?

I still consider myself a “newcomer” to the horse world, having been introduced to the whole scene about 15 years ago, but knowing I have plenty to learn in the next 15 years.

I was extremely lucky in that our first two horses were “pushbutton”- 15 and 8 year old Arabian cousins who had extensive training and came to us with few (if any) quirks. I naively thought, “This is pretty easy”.

A few years back I observed my first Natural Horsemanship Class, and was amazed at the control the instructor pressed on any horse he selected for particular exercises. (“games”) It may have taken awhile with uncooperative subjects, but he continued until he received the desired response. There was one woman in the class whose horse kept acting up during the games, and she would get called out by the instructor. The woman always seemed to have an excuse for the horse.... “he was abused, and didn’t like being around logs”...or “it was my fault, I was telling him to do it this (the wrong) way”.... I thought to myself, “Well, I’ll never make up excuses for my horses. I’ll just make them do what I want.” In hindsight, I realize now that I was never forced to make up excuses for my first two horses (who, by then, were 26 and 19) because they were pretty much just old agreeable buddies.)

Well, that all changed when a few months later I bought my first young horse. I had always wanted a roan, ever since a day I remember some 20 years prior when the setting sun was shining just so on this horse in a Warner Springs field. It made her look beautifully platinum. Well that whole memory was reincarnated when I saw a little 2 year old Arabian at a friend’s ranch in Redlands. Though I didn’t need another horse (we had 3 at the time), the price was right, the color was what I had always wanted, and I felt I could sell her if I had to.

She was anything but “pushbutton”. She didn’t even know she had buttons, and whichever ones she did have, were always ready to “pop”. But she was “my little girl”, and I “knew” exactly why she did certain things and I was always quick to forgive. When my wife, Vicki, suggested we sell her, I would have none of it. She was just “teal”- not quite “green” but not far from it. I was certain she would get better. Vicki was convinced I was having an “affair” with her, always making sure she got treats before I went to bed every night, and not caring if she didn’t seem appreciative when she’d head butt me if I was later than expected. (See there I go making excuses... “I was late.”) I had become that woman at the clinic.

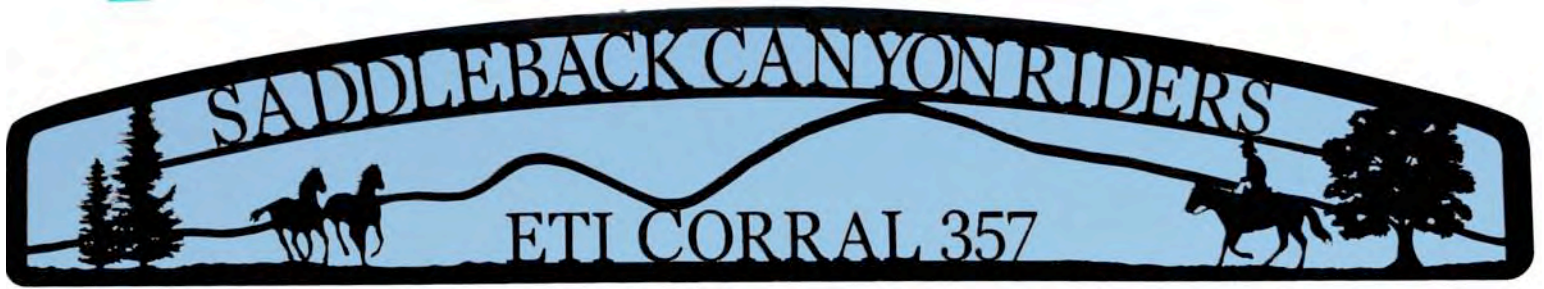
