## TRAIL BOSS REPORT

A recent event has given me cause to remember the past. It was back in '96 and I was just elected trail boss and I orchestrated my first trail maintenance day. At the bottom of the Hoffman Homestead trail, just before you connect with the end of the paved road was this bog. About a twenty-foot run of the trail would just turn into soup. It intersected a natural water shed runoff on the slope and the moment it was at its absolute worst, Debra Geary comes barreling through. Long story short, that provided some of us with our first large animal rescue opportunity. Anyway, the bog needed to be addressed without affecting the runoff. Like the water's gonna come hell or high...well, you get the picture. So what we did was trench down two feet for the twenty or so foot length of the bog and across the trail to the downside of the slope. The trench along the slope got filled with 3/4 gravel and I ran a commercial grade 6" pipe under the trail to the downside. French Trench with an appliance. It's still there and working fine. What's working fine and not all here is the crew. With the heartfelt departure of Ms Carol Cutri, Tom Ordway and I are all that remains. Geezz Louise, all of half that crew was missin' when the three Walters men departed. But it's all good. We're all moving on into the future, standing on the foundation of the past. End of month ride will be at NINE {that's 9:00am} on Saturday, May 31. Saturday, June 7 will be a trail maintenance day. Details to follow.

ETI357 Mounted Assistance Unit, lead by Debi Geary teamed up with Marc Hedgpeth's Equestrian Services to present an essential component of safe and enjoyable horse ownership. The all day clinic included instruction in defensive leading of a horse during an evacuation scenario. Also additional groundwork included maneuvering unfamiliar horses through obstacles to simulate gaining the confidence and respect necessary to safely handle a horse during an emergency.

The second portion of the day was spent covering the proper method of loading horses into a straight load trailer, slant load trailer, and stock trailer. And the day came to a close with hands on training in methods to gently and methodically coax unwilling horses into trailers.

# HORSE TALES

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Owning and caring for horses dictates the use of a variety of buckets. There is the water bucket, the oats bucket, the sponge bucket, just to name a few. Now, due to the popularity of a recent film, the bucket “list” has now worked its way into the American vernacular. And included in the “bucket list” for horse lovers should be a trip to Louisville on the first Saturday in May to attend the Kentucky Derby

Known as “the most exciting two minutes in sports”, this year marked the 134th running of the fabled race at historic Churchill Downs. Though the race is the centerpiece of that weekend, those two minutes are framed by the beauty, history, tradition, and hospitality of Kentucky. And one cannot experience Kentucky without appreciating the splendor of the American Equine.

The journey there should include a few extra days to drink in Louisville and the surrounding countryside that leads to the majestic farms in Lexington. It is there your senses will be treated to the infamous Kentucky Bluegrass. For miles and miles you will see rolling pastures framed by tidy fences that on some farms take \$100,000 per year to maintain. There are colonial mansions converted into elegant Bed and Breakfast Inns (I recommend the Storybook Inn in Versailles (pronounced “Ver- sales”). The bluegrass is native to the area, and it’s believed the root systems grown in the ore-rich soil are what make it ideal for building strong bones in the American Thoroughbred. The Kentucky Horse Park in Lexington is a must see, paying tribute to the American Horse as the backbone of American history and development. The Kentucky Derby Museum located beneath the twin spires of Churchill Downs is closed to the public on both Kentucky Oaks and Derby Day, so a visit either before or after those two days is strongly recommended to experience the vault of gems that are the previous 130 or so runnings of the Derby.

The day before the Derby is Kentucky Oaks Day featuring the 3 year old filly championship. The day is a local holiday with banks and schools closed, and is considered “Louisville’s day”, finding over 100,000 local residents celebrating the weekend on which the world’s focus is on their community. Don’t let the day disappear without sampling the Oaks Lily, a refreshing Vodka/Cranberry Concoction. The following day, the Mint Julep is the signature Derby Day drink, and top off any number of your meals with “Derby Pie,” best described as a creamy chocolate chip cookie in a flaky crust.

No matter where you are at on Derby Day – in the infield with thousands of Ohio coeds from liberal arts colleges (and I do mean “liberal”)- or upstairs near “Millionaire’s Row” with celebrities from around the world- one thing remains constant: there is nothing like Southern hospitality. The people are sweet, helpful, smiling, and always in a good mood.

But even if you’re sharing the day with 150,000 other event goers, don’t be surprised at who you run into. I was washing my hands at a local watering hole a few hours after the triumph of Big Brown, and the tragedy of Eight Belles ☹, when I heard a familiar, “Howdy pardner”. I turned to see fellow Trabucian and ETI president Rich Gomez. It goes to show you that sometimes those who have the same list, show up at the same bucket!

# PLAY DAY REPORT

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The Play Day on Saturday, May 17<sup>th</sup> took place on one of the hottest days of recent weeks. It was known that the temperature would climb, so the proceedings were started as early as possible.

The Barrel Competition was first on the agenda, and it had been decided to instigate a slight change to the customary rules. The barrels were undertaken at a trot, with penalties being awarded for breaking into a canter. Impressively, there were almost no infractions of this unfamiliar rule! The Pole Race followed the Barrels, and the third item was the Keyhole Competition.

The Keyhole Competition also had a slight alteration of the conventional rules that meant competitors had to reverse out of the circle after having completed their 360 degree turn. Good horsemanship and a well-trained, responsive horse helped in executing these tricky maneuvers competently.

Just prior to the start of the Egg & Spoon Competition, it suddenly became clear that the British version of this competition diverges widely from the American! This led to there only being one large spoon for all the competitors, added to which my Scottish frugality ensured that there were not nearly enough eggs to go round! Accordingly, there was no alternative but to conduct this competition along British lines. Each competitor balances the egg, in the spoon, and has to go from the start line, along the length of the arena, around the barrel at the far end, and all the way back to the finishing line. Some succumbed to the strong temptation of starting carefully and steadily, but then began to relax after reaching the turnaround point, and gradually increase speed on the homeward leg. This led to misfortune in many cases as dropping the egg constituted disqualification.

The Team Soccer was my favorite event of the day. In particular I liked Titan's support for his teammate, Summer, as she sped up the course rolling the ball ahead of her with great panache. Of course, his support was given from a cleverly strategic position – he was right behind her all the way!

The youngest competitor of the day was 6 year old Christopher who, with a little help from his Mom, procured a 3<sup>rd</sup> place in the Keyhole Competition, as well as two 5<sup>th</sup> place ribbons in other events.

A big thank you to all the members who put in great efforts to make this successful event run so smoothly! The club's next Play Day, which is scheduled for Saturday, June 21<sup>st</sup>, is being organized by the younger members of the club. I wish them every success for this event, and I'm looking forward to taking part as a competitor!


