PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE BY RICH GOMEZ

FINDING THE FEET...

Well as you all know by now, a horse-training icon, and someone

who did so much for every horse and rider passed away last March. Yep, I'm talking about the one and only Ray Hunt. Ray was exceptional in many ways but probably most memorable was the way he communicated with horses and people in a simple way. For us riders, it was the tips and insight he gave us about a horse. Like Ray often said, "Most people can't seem to rise up to the horse's level. They have to drag the horse down to their level." So with Ray it was all about doing things the horse's way. "...that when you ask your horse to do something it should be his idea...he wants to do it, he likes to do it, he understands how to do it, and he does it."

So when I was reading a recent issue of America's Horse (May 2009) and came across an article called, "All Work and No Play? How About Combining the Two on the Trails" with some tips on finding your horse's feet I thought of Ray and all the things he used to talk about...

"Think right down to the ground"
"The feet are in your hands"
"Get the feet soft and they'll be soft in the head"

You get the idea, so when I found these tips from Brent Graef I thought I'd share them with you...something to try...

- As your horse is walking, concentrate on your right leg. Feel the sway of your leg as your horse walks...it will sway out, then in, out, then in.
- When your leg feels closest in to the horse, the front foot on the same side is about to come off the ground. When your leg feels the furthest away from the horse, the hind leg on that side is about to come off the ground.

• Concentrate on one leg at a time and consider asking for help from the ground. If someone can call a particular foot, say the left hind as it's about to leave the ground, you can register what your body feels like at that moment.

Kinda cool, eh? Of course there are other ways to find the feet, but this seemed an easy way to feel what's happening. Like Graef says, "...the only time you can influence a horse's foot to move somewhere is when it's beginning to leave the ground."

And just like Ray Hunt, this horseman encourages us to find the feet so we know when to give the right cue at the best time. Your horse is ready for the cue, he's setup and prepared for the next thing.

It seems like sometimes we're just too much in a hurry to get going and forget about the importance of these basic ideas. I know for myself, it would do me better to slow down and thnk about what Ray had to say...


Ray Hunt's view of the horse is best said by Ray himself, "I'm here for the horse - to help him get a better deal". I like that. Let's all do what we can to make sure our trusted friends always get the best deal...






TRADIN' POST
