As you know we have our Emergency Response Team (ERT) within MAU and together these folks have just about perfected a way to communicate with radios, how to manage an emergency evacuation and how to identify lost animals. You all know we've had microchip clinics to get each of your horses chipped for accurate identification in case you're ever sepa-

rated. In addition to these clinics, your Corral has also purchased two Avid Chip Readers. These are the electronic devices that actually read and identify the details associated with any registered chip implant in an animal; in other words, how to identify the owner and help get the two of 'em back together. Well here's the story...

Last month, one of our neighbors (we think) lost a couple of dogs and they were running around near Mountain View. I can't imagine how these owners felt because I know we sure would be frantic if our dog was lost – I know you all feel the same way about our canine family members. Well I'm not sure exactly who heard about this but someone contacted our ERT coordinator Debbie Kelly and Debbie jumped into action...or at least drove over to where the dogs were. She had our Corral Avid Chip Reader and she had the foresight to think the lost dogs may be chipped...well guess what? They were! Can you imagine how good Debbie felt to find a registered chip in one of these lost dogs? What a great sense of pride and what a relief! I've gotta tell you this makes me so proud of our club and so glad your Board decided to approve and purchase these reader devices. I think it says a lot about who we are and how we roll! This one "find" makes the whole process (training) and the entire expense (buying the readers with Corral funds that you EACH contribute to) worthwhile.

You should all be very proud of our Corral; I know I sure am. And a big Corral thanks to Debbie Kelly and the entire MAU/ERT group for givin' us something else to be proud of...

So, as always, until we get together next, here's to all of us helpin' together and ridin' together...see you on the trail...

The reason I bring this all up is because of a story I read about today in my "Inbox". It seems a few months ago

They sent out e-mails telling the story with pictures attached to everyone they knew, pleading for help.
