

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# REMINDS ME OF A STORY...

## The King and the Rising Sun

I don't know about you, but there are certain historical events that occur that I can remember exactly where I was when I first heard about them. The shooting of John and Robert Kennedy, the death of Princess Diana, The Miracle on ice in the 1980 Olympics, and the horror of 9-11 all have an indelible place in my memory bank that will never disappear. Another death, that of Elvis Presley, also sticks in my mind, on a hot summer evening in August, with me behind the grill during the dinner rush at a steakhouse. I remember putting down my tongs and spatula, and finding the nearest TV to garner some details. I know that dalliance got me behind that night, and I remember never catching up. It's not that I was such a big fan, he was a little before my time really, but I remember my aunt and my cousin, who were like my sisters, would take me to the movies and while they swooned, I remember a warm sensation knowing that they were happy. With his death, a piece of those happy memories escaped my soul. It felt as though "my sisters" were forever hopelessly left at the altar of their dreams.

About 20 years ago I had to go to Memphis for business on a few occasions, and decided one late

afternoon after work I would squeeze in a visit to Graceland. I had a vision of what it would look like... rolling hills with white rail fencing, horses grazing on bluegrass, the house set back on a long winding tree-lined driveway, a plantation mansion that you might have seen in *Gone with the Wind*. However, when I arrived, my lionized image came crashing down. It was like experiencing the disappointment of his death all over again! It would be like putting a ranch on Harbor Boulevard near Disneyland. Cheap motels, fast food galore, and souvenir shops surrounding the property degraded the aura of the King's Castle. I do remember the horses grazing on what seemed like a front lawn, and I did take to them which gave me at least a little warmth on the grounds.

It wasn't until we became members of the Quarter Horse Association and began getting "America's Horse Magazine", that I learned more about the history of those horses at Graceland.

Elvis bought his first horse for Priscilla in 1966, a black quarter horse named Domino. Elvis saw Priscilla was a really good rider, and he was a little shy about riding. But by January 1967, he decided that he was ready to try riding his own horse. He would get up at 4 am and start driving around to all the horse farms within a 50 mile radius of Graceland and ask, "Hey do

you have a Palomino for sale?" (Those were the days before the Internet!) Finally his Father had heard about a Palomino for sale in Mississippi through Johnny Cash's Manager. The horse had been a Western Pleasure horse but had soured on the show ring. Priscilla went to see the horse, rode him, and decided he was the one for Elvis. He cost \$3000. Elvis fell in love with him immediately, and named him Rising Sun. (Breyer has a replica of him in their catalog). He named his barn "House of the Rising Sun." He would ride every morning when he was home before breakfast, and ride down to the road where fans tried to get pictures, then race back.

Priscilla said in a 1996 documentary, "Elvis had such little privacy. The stables were a place where Elvis could go and not have to be Elvis the Entertainer. He found solitude and comfort there." Isn't that the way it is with us? I know when I'm down at the barn I don't have to be the salesman, at my client's beck and call. I don't have to be a parent, bearing all the responsibilities that come with it. I don't have to be a homeowner, worried about yardwork. I can just be me, a friend to an animal 8 times my weight.

Rising Sun lived 10 years after Elvis' death. He's buried at Graceland, facing the east, where he will always look into the Rising Sun. There will



always be a palomino to carry on the legacy of Rising Sun. Today, it is a horse named Tuscan Sun, a distant relative to the namesake of the barn. If I were to return to Graceland, I'm sure the view will be much better. For me now knowing the history, paralleled to mine, that I, like Elvis, always wanted a palomino, will put a smile on my face as I gaze into the Tuscan Sun.

I got to the stables early and as Mocha looked up, he could tell we would be saddling up so he began eating his hay faster than usual. Horses always seem to know what is going on.

I decided to saddle him while he was eating so he would not be hungry on the ride. As I began tightening the girth, he seemed to be calmer than usual. I just chalked that up to him wanting to get out for a while. So, we headed out of the gate, crossed the street to the stump, then headed down the road. Everything felt the same as usual...Mocha walking slow and me clicking to get him to step up his gate. The usual.



It was such a beautiful morning as we headed out the Arroyo. I could feel his legs were stiff, probably from arthritis, he is 23, after all. So, we walked on for quite a way before I got him to start trotting and then a short canter from time to time. Before too long, we had crossed the narrow creek, the dried big creek then out by the homes in Arroyo Vista. I was pleasantly surprised that the park had worked hard leveling the dirt road and getting rid of all the rocks.

We turned around after about 2 hours and began heading back toward the main park. As usual, Mocha knew we were heading back so he stepped up his gate. We cantered, trotted and walked fast a good part of the return. Mocha had been known to trip on occasion but always was able to recover, until today.

We had passed by the toll road bridge on our return, cantering slowly as we approached two mountain bikers heading toward us. Just as

we came upon them, Mocha's right foot caught on the dirt and he began to trip. He tried desperately to regain his footing by pulling up his left foot, but to no avail, we were going down. Even though everything happened so fast, I remember time seemed to move in slow motion. I felt like I had time

to decide how I was going to roll off. But as nature would have it, Mocha fell left and landed hard on me as well as the left pommel of my saddle. I remember hearing the two bikers yelling in astonishment and fear as they watched the whole event unfold.

They came running over to me, one of them taking hold of Mocha's rein as he righted himself, the other telling me not to move. My first inclination was to jump up, but as I tried, I realized I just couldn't get up. The two guys were awesome, their only concern was for me, neither seemed to be afraid of the scared horse or the fact we were out in the middle of nowhere. They actually helped me up and walked me over to a rock to sit down. They got my phone number and rode off to find the ranger.

I remember thinking how light headed I was, how my head was pounding and I felt like throwing up, but I needed to get Mocha back to the stables. Mocha's knees were all bloody as was the area above his eye and nose and I wanted to get him home. So, I got up slowly, on shaky legs and tried to walk back down the Arroyo. I was too shaken up to make the walk so I found another rock and sat down, panic was setting in.

As I sat there, I realized I needed help. Who could I call? This is where the Club came in. As a board member, I am always thinking of reasons why someone should join the club. What's in it for them? Well I found the best answer of all.

I thought of all the people I ride with most, Debbie, Jim and Patti. All of whom are in the Saddleback Canyon Rider Club. So, I called Debbie first. Of

course, I got lucky, she answered right away and I explained what happened. She immediately began making calls to the park ranger and to others who she knew would help. Before long, the park rangers, all 6 of them, showed up in a pick-up truck. I was so relieved that I was getting help but my biggest concern now was Mocha and how he was going to get home and cleaned up. Not five minutes went by and I saw Dave walking up to collect Mocha. As I headed out of the Arroyo in the truck, we ran into Debbie also coming to help. Wow, what a group of amazing people. Between them, they got Mocha back home, rinsed off and in his stall. Debbie even came

back later with a box full of medical supplies to tend to Mocha.

The rangers took me over to the fire station to get checked out. As I sat there, Ranger Diane said she had spoken with other members of the club including Patti. Patti had offered to sit with me to ensure that I had help should I have a concussion. Before long, I made it home and rested for a good part of the day. I received multiple calls from people in the club offering to help in any way they could. I was so humbled by the outpouring of concern and care that all of these people had for me. They were members of My Club and they

were there for me.

That is why I belong to the Saddleback Canyon Riders Club. It's not just for the comradery or to find someone to ride with, it's because we are a family, there to help each other when needed. I know that anytime I ride, no matter what happens, there will be a corps of people that I can call at a moment's notice. And it is a two-way street. I will be there for any of my club members when the call comes in. It does take a club, my club.

# MY TIME AS AN OC PARK VOLUNTEER

To my best recollection it began sometime between 2002 and 2003. The club decided to bring back a Mounted Assistance Unit (MAU) to work closely with the OC Parks system and the US Forest Service as volunteers patrolling the parks and trails. In order to do that in an official capacity and to be able to submit our hours in the park to the county, we took the appropriate training as Adopt A Park volunteers. We were already doing that and you could see the ETI name on some of the trails in O'Neill Park that we had already "adopted".




As stewards of the trails it made sense to embrace their program that linked our club and its commitment to the program that served both the county and our equestrian lifestyle.

Our legacy in O'Neill Park is diverse. When I joined the club in 1994 Trail Maintenance was the crown jewel. It was monthly, held on the first Saturday of the month. There was rarely a shortage of volunteers and always trails to be groomed. The Trail Boss would be responsible to coordinate and we often engaged the assistance of other focus groups such as the Boy Scouts, Trails for All, the Warrior Society and others. Together we could do more and augment the work already being done by the park staff. Over the years I have worked with several park rangers in O'Neill and each one has always expressed appreciation for the work we do; and for our presence. OC Park volunteers not only record hours but we are the eyes and ears, often reporting situations such as a tree down or unusual behavior. We also educate and I have had the occasion to call the park more than once when I have observed a violation.

As an OC Park volunteer (formerly Adopt a Park) we are trained in the most effective way to trim trees, branches, and over growth. We are

in some ways temporary employees while out there so we are trained in the standard of reporting and educating the public. We attend First Aid and CPR training every two years at one of the park systems facilities. Over the years I have met so many likeminded volunteers and it is rewarding to continue to see them at these events.

I have had opportunities over the years to participate in OC Park events not related to the club or trails but offered the opportunity to promote ETI and the equestrian lifestyle. More than once our late and beloved Karen Balthaser showcased our club, love of horses and outdoors, her love of children and basically the human race at events put on by OC Parks. I recall an event at Santiago Oaks Park years ago. There were horse people of all disciplines from across the county, along with vendors who showcased the horse with education, demonstrations, games, rides and networking. It was like the Horse Affair on a smaller level. Karen had games and prizes at our booth and we highlighted our club as we were the only local horse club offering such a variety of horse related activities. She and I talked about that for years and I still use the little trifold brochures we made. Well, she made. Later,



Karen would bring back our club's participation with Acorn Day right in O'Neill Park. She was an OC Park volunteer and wore the vest proudly.

One of the highlights of the year for me is the OC Parks Volunteer recognition dinner. It is always at one of the beautiful parks, outside with a delicious catered dinner, bar, and live music. There is nothing like celebrating nature in nature. I had the privilege of attending this year, just prior to this writing and once again reconnected with so many people I know as a result of this program. Each park ranger in the system spoke

and recognized one key volunteer. Our own Ranger Diane Wallenberg recognized one of the newer park volunteers who has given a great deal in just one year. A large number of OC Park volunteers are retirees who have found a rewarding way to spend their time.

From our club at this event was our own Madam Modjeka Sue Marucci, Jeff Kelly, and myself. There is room for so many more and I hope anyone reading this will consider joining the ranks of the OC Park Volunteer system. In the past

year over 63,000 volunteer hours were recorded which equates to two million dollars in wages. We augment the efforts of the park system while allowing dwindling budgets to guarantee programs and public use to remain intact. This kind of dedication and commitment will ensure that our parks and programs here in Orange County will continue for years to come.
